Click **Edit** > **Advanced Search**. Enter the keyword (text) for information you want to find in the search window, and then click **Search**. Hits are displayed as a list. Click one of the displayed hits to jump to that page.




Jumping Directly from Bookmarks

Click a title to jump to that page. Click + or > to view the lower level titles in that section. To return to the previous page, perform the following operation on your keyboard.

• Windows: Hold down **Alt**, and then press ←.

• Mac OS: Hold down the command key, and then press ←.




Printing Only the Pages You Need

You can extract and print only the pages you need. Click **Print** in the **File** menu, and then specify the pages you want to print in **Pages** in **Pages to Print**.

• To specify a series of pages, enter a hyphen between the start page and the end page.

Example: 20-25

• To specify pages that are not in series, divide the pages with commas. Example: 5, 10, 15







| 4 | NFC tag | Uses NFC technology to transfer projector information through your mobile device. The Projector Config Tool app lets you scan projector information and write settings. |
| 5 | Connector ports | Connects interface cables. |






Installing the Safety Wire

When you use the optional ceiling mount, you can install the safety wire to prevent the projector from falling from the ceiling.

Secure the ring using the M6 \times 15 mm bolt supplied with the safety wire set, and loop the safety wire through the ceiling mount to secure it as shown.



The remote control uses the two AA batteries that came with the projector.



Replace the batteries as soon as they run out. The remote control uses two AA manganese or alkaline batteries.





Remote Control Operation

The remote control lets you control the projector from almost anywhere in the room.

Make sure that you aim the remote control at the projector's receivers within the distance and angles listed here.


- Depending on your installation environment, the available distance and angles may be shortened.
- Avoid using the remote control in conditions with bright fluorescent lights or in direct sunlight, or the projector may not respond to commands. If you are not going to use the remote control for a long time, remove the batteries.
- When you use multiple projectors in the same room or when there are obstacles around the remote receiver, interference may cause projector operations to become unstable. Connect the optional remote control cable set to the projectors. When the cable set is connected, you can operate projectors stably.

Locking the Remote Control Buttons

You can lock some of the buttons on the remote control.


To lock the remote control buttons shown here, press and hold the [Home] button on the remote control for approximately 5 seconds.

There are many glass parts and precision components inside the projector. To prevent damage due to impacts when transporting, handle the projector as follows.



A Caution

The projector should not be carried by one person. At least two people are needed to unpack or carry the projector.

Attention

- Remove the lens unit if an option lens is installed.
- If the projector does not have a lens, attach the cover that was on the lens mount when you purchased the projector.

You can install the projector or mount it to the ceiling at any horizontal or vertical angle. Note the following precautions when installing the projector.

Marning


- A special method of installation is required when suspending the projector from a wall or ceiling. If you do not install the projector correctly, it could fall and cause damage or injury.
- Do not use adhesives on the ceiling mount fixing points to prevent the screws from loosening, or use lubricants, oils, or similar substances on the projector; the projector case may crack causing it to fall from its ceiling mount. This could cause serious injury to anyone under the ceiling mount and could damage the projector.
- Do not install the projector in a location subject to high levels of dust or humidity, or in a location subject to smoke or steam. Otherwise, it could cause a fire or electric shock to occur. The projector's case could also deteriorate and be damaged causing the projector to fall from the mount.

Examples of environments that could cause the projector to fall due to case deterioration


- Locations subject to excessive smoke or airborne oil particles, such as factories or kitchens
- Locations containing volatile solvents or chemicals, such as factories or laboratories
- Locations where the projector could be subjected to detergents or chemicals, such as factories or kitchens
- Locations in which aroma oils are often used, such as relaxation rooms
- Near devices that produce excessive smoke, airborne oil particles, or foam at events

Attention

• Use M6 screws (up to a depth of 14 mm) to fix the projector's ceiling mount fixing points and the mounting hardware at four points.





Attaching and Removing a Lens

Make sure you turn off the projector and unplug the power cord before attaching or removing a lens. Otherwise, you may receive an electric shock.

Attention

- If dust or dirt gets inside the projector, projection quality deteriorates and it could cause a malfunction. Be sure to observe the following precautions when handling.
 - Make sure the front of the projector is not facing up when you attach or remove the lens.
 - Remove the lens only when necessary.
 - Store the projector with the lens installed.
- Avoid touching the lens with your bare hands to prevent fingerprints on or damage to the lens surface.

Turning On the Projector

Turn on the computer or video equipment you want to use after you turn on the projector.



Connect the power cord to the projector's power inlet and plug it into an electrical outlet.



The projector's power indicator turns blue. This indicates that the projector is receiving power, but is not yet turned on (it is in standby mode).



Press the [On] button on the control panel or remote control to turn on the projector.

The projector beeps and the status indicator flashes blue as the projector warms up. Once the projector is warmed up, the status indicator stops flashing and turns blue.



- When **Quick Startup** is enabled in the projector's **Extended** menu, the projector becomes ready for use in several seconds the next time you press the power button.
- Extended > Operation > Quick Startup

Try the following if you do not see a projected image.

- Turn on the connected computer or video device.
- Change the screen output from the computer when using a laptop computer.
- Insert a DVD or other video media, and press play (if necessary).
- Press the [Search] button on the control panel or remote control to detect the source.
- Press the button for the desired video source on the remote control.
- If the Home screen is displayed, select the source you want to project.

Marning

- Never look into the projector lens when the light source is on. This can damage your eyes and is especially dangerous for children.
- When turning on the projector at a distance using the remote control, make sure there is no one looking into the lens.
- During projection, do not block the light from the projector with a book or other objects. If the light from the projector is blocked, the area on which the light shines becomes hot which could cause it to melt, burn, or start a fire. Also, the lens may get hot due to the reflected light which could cause the projector to malfunction. To stop projection, use the A/V Mute function, or turn off the projector.



- When the **Direct Power On** setting is set to **On** in the projector's **Extended** menu, the projector turns on as soon as you plug it in. Note that the projector also turns on automatically in cases such as recovery from a power outage.
 - **Extended** > Operation > Direct Power On
- If you select a specific port as the **Auto Power On** setting in the projector's **Extended** menu, the projector turns on as soon as it detects a signal or cable connection from that port.
- Extended > Operation > Auto Power On

Turning Off the Projector

Turn off the projector after use.



- Turn off this product when it is not in use to prolong the life of the projector. Light source life varies depending on the mode selected, environmental conditions, and usage. Brightness decreases over time.
- Light source calibration starts automatically if you turn off the projector and the following conditions are present:
- The **Light Source Calibration** setting is set to **Run Periodically** in the projector's **Reset** menu
- 100 hours have passed since the last light source calibration
- You have used the projector continuously for more than 20 minutes
- Since the projector supports the direct shutdown feature, it can be turned off directly using the breaker.
- Press the [Standby] button on the control panel or remote control. The projector displays a shutdown confirmation screen.
- Press the [Standby] button again. (To leave it on, press any other button.)

The projector beeps twice, the light source turns off, and the status indicator turns off.

To transport or store the projector, make sure the status indicator on the projector is off, and then unplug the power cord.

You can send images to your projector, as well as monitor and control your projector, over a network.

To perform these operations, connect the projector to your network, and then set up your projector and computer.

After connecting and setting up the projector as described here, download and install the following network software from the following Web site.

Connecting to a Wired Network

To connect the projector to a wired local area network (LAN), use a 100Base-TX or 10Base-T network cable. To ensure proper data transmission, use a Category 5 shielded cable or better.

- Connect one end of the network cable to your network hub, switch, or router.
- **2** Connect the other end of the cable to the projector's LAN port.

Selecting Wired Network Settings

Before you can project from computers on your network, you need to select network settings on the projector.



Make sure you already connected the projector to your wired network using the LAN port.

- Press the [Menu] button, select the **Network** menu, and press [Enter].
- Select **Network Configuration** and press [Enter].
- Select the **Basic** menu and press [Enter].
- Select the basic options as necessary.
 - **Projector Name** lets you enter a name up to 16 alphanumeric characters long to identify the projector over the network.
 - **PJLink Password** lets you enter a password up to 32 alphanumeric characters long for using the PJLink protocol for projector control.
 - **Remote Password** lets you enter a password up to 32 alphanumeric characters long to access the projector using the Basic Control. (User name is **EPSONREMOTE**; default password is the projector's serial number.)
 - Web Control Password lets you enter a password up to 32 alphanumeric characters long to access the projector over the Web. (User name is EPSONWEB; default password is the projector's serial number.)
 - Moderator Password lets you enter a four-digit number password for accessing the projector as a moderator using Epson iProjection. (No password is set by default.)
 - **Projector Keyword** lets you turn on a security password to prevent access to the projector by anyone not in the room with it. You must enter a displayed, randomized keyword from a computer using Epson iProjection to access the projector and share the current screen.

- **Display Keyword** lets you select whether to display a projector keyword on the projected image when accessing the projector using Epson iProjection.
- **Display LAN Info.** lets you set the display format for the projector's network information.



Use the displayed keyboard to enter numbers and characters. Press the arrow buttons on the remote control to highlight characters and press [Enter] to select them.

- Select the **Wired LAN** menu and press [Enter].
- 6 Assign the IP settings for your network as necessary.
 - If your network assigns addresses automatically, select **IP Settings** to set the **DHCP** setting to **On**.
 - If you must set addresses manually, select IP Settings to set the DHCP setting to Off, and then enter the projector's IP Address, Subnet Mask, and Gateway Address as necessary.
 - If you want to connect the projector to the network using IPv6, select IPv6 Settings to set the IPv6 setting to On, and then set the Auto Configuration and Use Temporary Address settings as necessary.



To highlight the numbers you want from the displayed keyboard, press the arrow buttons on the remote control. To select a highlighted number, press [Enter].

- To prevent the IP address from being displayed on the LAN standby screen and Home screen, set the **IP Address Display** setting to **Off**.
- When you finish selecting settings, select **Complete** and follow the onscreen instructions to save your settings and exit the menus.
- Press the [LAN] button on the remote control.

 The wired network settings complete when you see the correct IP address on the LAN standby screen.







- Press the [Menu] button, select the **Network** menu, and press [Enter].

- **S**elect the basic options as necessary.
 - **Projector Name** lets you enter a name up to 16 alphanumeric characters long to identify the projector over the network.
 - **PJLink Password** lets you enter a password up to 32 alphanumeric characters long for using the PJLink protocol for projector control.
 - Remote Password lets you enter a password up to 32 alphanumeric characters long to access the projector using the Basic Control. (User name is EPSONREMOTE; default password is the projector's serial number.)
 - Web Control Password lets you enter a password up to 32 alphanumeric characters long to access the projector over the Web. (User name is EPSONWEB; default password is the projector's serial number.)
 - Moderator Password lets you enter a four-digit number password for accessing the projector as a moderator using Epson iProjection. (No password is set by default.)
 - **Projector Keyword** lets you turn on a security password to prevent access to the projector by anyone not in the room with it. You must enter a displayed, randomized keyword from a computer using Epson iProjection to access the projector and share the current screen.

- **Display Keyword** lets you select whether to display a projector keyword on the projected image when accessing the projector using Epson iProjection.
- **Display LAN Info.** lets you set the display format for the projector's network information.



Use the displayed keyboard to enter numbers and characters. Press the arrow buttons on the remote control to highlight characters and press [Enter] to select them.

- 6 Select the Wireless LAN menu and press [Enter].
- **7** Select the **Connection Mode** setting.
 - Quick lets you connect to multiple smartphones, tablets, or computers directly using wireless communication.
 - **Advanced** lets you connect to smartphones, tablets, or computers over a wireless network access point.
- If you selected the **Advanced** connection mode, select **Search Access Point** to select the access point you want to connect to.



If you need to assign the SSID manually, select **SSID** to enter the SSID.

- For the **Advanced** connection mode, assign the IP settings for your network as necessary.
 - If your network assigns addresses automatically, select **IP Settings** to set the **DHCP** setting to **On**.
 - If you must set addresses manually, select IP Settings to set the DHCP setting to Off, and then enter the projector's IP Address, Subnet Mask, and Gateway Address as necessary.
 - If you want to connect the projector to the network using IPv6, select IPv6 Settings to set the IPv6 setting to On, and then set the Auto Configuration and Use Temporary Address settings as necessary.

- To prevent the SSID or IP address from being displayed on the LAN standby screen and Home screen, set the SSID Display setting or the IP Address Display setting to Off.
- When you finish selecting settings, select **Complete** and follow the onscreen instructions to save your settings and exit the menus.
- Press the [LAN] button on the remote control.

 The wireless network settings are complete when you see the correct IP address on the LAN standby screen.

When you have finished making wireless settings for your projector, you need to select the wireless network on your computer. Then start the network software to send images to your projector through a wireless network.

- If the Windows Firewall message is displayed, click **Yes** to disable the firewall.
- You need administrator authority to install the software.
- If it is not installed automatically, double-click **MPPLaunch.exe** in the USB key.

After a few minutes, your computer image is displayed by the projector.

When you have finished projecting wirelessly, select the **Safely Remove Hardware** option in the Windows taskbar, and then remove the USB key from your computer.



You may need to restart your computer to reactivate your wireless LAN connection.



Home Screen 49

The Home screen feature allows you to easily select an image source and access useful functions. You can display the Home screen by pressing the [Home] button on the remote control. The Home screen is also displayed when you turn on the projector and no signal is being input.

Press the arrow buttons on the remote control to select a menu item, and then press [Enter].




- Selects the source you want to project.
- Displays the Connection Guide. You can select the wireless connection methods according to the devices you are using, such as smartphones or computers.
- 3 Indicates the projector is in Content Playback mode.
- Displays the Help screen.
- 6 Displays the projector's menu.
- Performs menu options assigned to Home Screen in the projector's Extended menu.
- Selects the brightness for the light source.
- 8 Changes the projector's color mode.



The Home screen disappears after 10 minutes of inactivity.

You can use the projector's menus to adjust the settings that control how your projector works. The projector displays the menus on the screen.

Press the [Menu] button on the control panel or remote control. You see the menu screen displaying the **Image** menu settings.



Press the up or down arrow buttons to move through the menus listed on the left. The settings for each menu are displayed on the right.



The available settings depend on the current input source.

- To change settings in the displayed menu, press [Enter].
- Press the up or down arrow button to move through the settings.
- Change the settings using the buttons listed on the bottom of the menu screens.
- To return all the menu settings to their default values, select **Reset**.
- When you finish changing settings on a menu, press [Esc].

Press [Menu] or [Esc] to exit the menus.

Using the Displayed Keyboard

You can use the displayed keyboard to enter numbers and characters.



Use the arrow buttons on the control panel or remote control to highlight the number or character you want to enter and press the [Enter] button.





Each time you select the **CAPS** key, the characters change between upper case and lower case. Each time you select the **SYM1/2** key, the symbols enclosed by the frame change.



After entering the text, select **Finish** on the keyboard to confirm your entries. Select **Cancel** to cancel entering text.



You can select projector settings and control projection over a network using a Web browser from your computer.





Source Search


When multiple image sources are connected to the projector, such as a computer and DVD player, you can switch from one image source to the other.

Execution Method

- Press the [Search] (remote control) or [Source Search] (control panel) button on the control panel or remote control until you see the image from the source you want.
- Press the button for the source you want on the remote control. If there is more than one port for that source, press the button again to cycle through the sources.
- Press the [Home] button on the remote control. Then select the source you want to use from the screen displayed.

A/V Mute

You can temporarily turn off the projected image and sound. Any sound or video action continues to run, however, so you cannot resume projection at the point that you stopped it.





Lens Shift

If you cannot install the projector directly in front of the screen, you can adjust the position of the projected image using the lens shift feature.



You can check the available lens shift range in the projector's *Specifications*.

Execution Method

- Press the [Lens Shift] button on the remote control.
- Press the [Lens] button on the control panel until the lens shift adjustment screen is displayed.



Caution

When shifting the lens, do not put your hands near the lens unit. Your fingers may get caught between the lens unit and the projector, and cause an injury.



- Wait 20 minutes after turning on the projector before setting the lens shift for maximum accuracy.
- When adjusting the image height, position the image lower than where you want it to be and then move it up. This will help prevent the image from moving down after adjustment.
- The image is clearest when the lens is at the home position. To move the lens to the home position, hold the [Lens Shift] button on the remote control or the [Lens] button on the control panel for more than 3 seconds.

Zoom

You can resize the image.



Execution Method

- Press the [Zoom] button on the remote control.
- Press the [Lens] button on the control panel until the zoom adjustment screen is displayed.

Aspect

The projector can display images in different width-to-height ratios called aspect ratios. Normally, the input signal from your video source determines the image's aspect ratio. However, you can change the aspect ratio for certain images to fit your screen.

Panel Alignment

You can adjust the pixel color shift for the LCD panel. You can adjust the pixels horizontally and vertically in 0.125 pixels increments within a range of ± 3 pixels.




Using Basic Projector Features

Execution Method

Extended > Display > Panel Alignment

Color Uniformity

If the color tone of the image is uneven, you can adjust the color tone balance.



Execution Method

Extended > Display > Color Uniformity

Refresh Mode

The refresh mode process clears any projected afterimage and turns off the projector after a specified period of time.

Execution Method

Reset > Refresh Mode

Light Source Calibration

The light source calibration process optimizes the color balance of the currently projected image.

Execution Method

Reset > Light Source Calibration

Memory

You can save customized settings and then select the saved settings whenever you want to use them.

Execution Method

- Press the [Memory] button on the remote control.
- Change the projector's menu:
- Settings > Memory

Schedule Settings


You can schedule up to 30 events to occur automatically on your projector, such as turning the projector on or off or switching the input source. The projector performs the selected events on the specified date and time in the schedule you set up.

Execution Method

Extended > Schedule Settings


Button Lock

Button lock security to block operation of the projector using the buttons on the control panel or remote control.



Even if you can lock the buttons on the control panel, you can still use the remote control as usual.

The remote control buttons lock feature locks the following buttons.



Execution Method

- To lock the control panel buttons, hold down the control panel lock button on the control panel.
- To unlock the control panel buttons, hold down the [Enter] button on the control panel for approximately 7 seconds.
- To lock the remote control buttons, hold down the [Home] button on the remote control for approximately 5 seconds.
- To unlock the remote control buttons, hold down the [Home] button again for approximately 5 seconds.

Password Protection

Password security to prevent people who do not know the password from using the projector, and prevent changes to the startup screen and other settings.





You can set up the following types of password security using one shared password:

- Power On Protection prevents anyone from using the projector without first entering a password. When plugging the power cord and turning on the projector at first time, you must enter the correct password. This also applies to Direct Power On and Auto Power On.
- **User's Logo Protection** prevents anyone from changing the custom screen displayed when the projector turns on, when no signal is being input, or when you use the A/V Mute feature. The custom screen discourages theft by identifying the projector's owner.
- **Network Protection** prevents anyone from changing the projector's **Network** settings.
- **Schedule Protection** prevents anyone from changing the projector's schedule settings.
- Remote Camera Access prevents anyone from using the Remote Camera Access function.

Execution Method

Hold the [Freeze] button on the remote control for approximately 5 seconds.



You can set a four-digit password. Hold down the [Num] button on the remote control and use the numeric buttons to set a password. The default password is set to "0000".

Attention

- If an incorrect password is entered three times in succession, the message "The projector's operation will be locked." is displayed for approximately 5 minutes, and the projector switches to standby mode. If this happens, disconnect the power plug from the electrical outlet, reinsert it, and turn the projector back on. The projector displays the password entry screen again so that you can enter the correct password.
- If you have forgotten the password, make a note of the "**Request Code**: xxxxx" number that appears on the screen and contact Epson for help.
- If you continue to repeat the above operation and input the wrong password 30 times in succession, the message "The projector's operation will be locked. Contact Epson as described in your documentation." is displayed and the projector does not accept any more password entries. Contact Epson for help.

After selecting the projector's menu settings for one projector, you can use the following methods to copy the settings to other projectors, as long as they are the same model.

- by using a USB flash drive
- by connecting a computer and projector using a USB cable
- by using Epson Projector Management
- by using Projector Config Tool

You cannot copy any information unique to an individual projector, such as Light Source Hours or Status.



- Perform batch setup before adjusting the image settings such as keystone distortion correction. Since image adjustment values are also copied to another projector, the adjustments you made before performing the batch setup are overwritten and the projected screen you adjusted may change.
- When copying the menu settings from one projector to another, user's logo is also copied. Do not register the information that you do not want to share between multiple projectors as a user's logo.
- Make sure **Batch Setup Range** is set to **Limited** if you do not want to copy the following settings:
- Password Protection settings
- EDID in the Signal menu
- Network menu settings (except for the Notifications menu and the **Others** menu)
- You can only copy the following settings using the Projector Config Tool:
- Projector Name
- Asset information
- IP Address for a wired network
- Subnet Mask for a wired network
- NFC Write Password

Transferring Settings From a USB Flash Drive

You can copy menu settings from one projector to another of the same model using a USB flash drive.



The USB flash drive must use a FAT format and not incorporate any security function. Delete any files on the drive before using it for batch setup or the settings may not be saved correctly.

- Disconnect the power cord from the projector, and check that all of the projector's indicators have turned off.
- Connect an empty USB flash drive directly to the projector's USB-A port.
- Hold down the [Esc] button on the remote control or the control panel and connect the power cord to the projector.
- When all of the projector's indicators other than the filter indicator turn on, release the [Esc] button.

The indicators start flashing and the batch setup file is written to the USB flash drive. When writing is finished, the projector turns off.



Caution

Do not disconnect the power cord or the USB flash drive from the projector while the file is being written. If the power cord or USB flash drive is disconnected, the projector may not start correctly.

Remove the USB flash drive.



The file name for the batch setup file is PJCONFDATA.bin. If you need to change the file name, add text after PJCONFDATA using only alphanumeric characters. If you change the PJCONFDATA section of the file name, the projector may not be able to recognize the file correctly.

- Disconnect the power cord from the projector to which you want to copy settings, and check that all of the projector's indicators have turned off.
- Connect the USB flash drive containing the saved batch setup file to the projector's USB-A port.
- Hold down the [Menu] button on the remote control or the control panel and connect the power cord to the projector.
- When all of the projector's indicators other than the filter indicator turn on, release the [Menu] button. (The indicators remain on for approximately 75 seconds.)

When all of the indicators start flashing, the settings are being written. When writing is finished, the projector turns off.



A Caution

Do not disconnect the power cord or the USB flash drive from the projector while the file is being written. If the power cord or USB flash drive is disconnected, the projector may not start correctly.

Remove the USB flash drive.

Transferring Settings From a Computer

You can copy menu settings from one projector to another of the same model by connecting the computer and projector with a USB cable.



You can use this batch setup method with the following operating system versions:

- Windows 7 and later
- OS X 10.11.x and later
- Disconnect the power cord from the projector, and check that all of the projector's indicators have turned off.
- Connect a USB cable to the computer's USB port and to the projector's Service port.
- Hold down the [Esc] button on the remote control or the control panel and connect the power cord to the projector.
- When all of the projector's indicators other than the filter indicator turn on, release the [Esc] button.

The computer recognizes the projector as a removable disk.

Open the removable disk icon or folder, and save the batch setup file to the computer.



The file name for the batch setup file is PJCONFDATA.bin. If you need to change the file name, add text after PJCONFDATA using only alphanumeric characters. If you change the PJCONFDATA section of the file name, the projector may not be able to recognize the file correctly.

- Eject the USB device (Windows) or drag the removable disk icon to the Trash (Mac).
- Disconnect the USB cable.

The projector turns off.

- Disconnect the power cord from the projector to which you want to copy settings, and check that all of the projector's indicators have turned off.
- Connect the USB cable to the computer's USB port and to the projector's Service port.
- Hold down the [Menu] button on the remote control or the control panel and connect the power cord to the projector.
- When all of the projector's indicators other than the filter indicator turn on, release the [Menu] button.

The computer recognizes the projector as a removable disk.

Copy the batch setup file (PJCONFDATA.bin) that you saved to your computer to the top level folder of the removable disk.



Do not copy any files or folders other than the batch setup file to the removable disk.

- Eject the USB device (Windows) or drag the removable disk icon to the Trash (Mac).
- Disconnect the USB cable.

When all of the indicators start flashing, the settings are being written. When writing is finished, the projector turns off.



Caution

Do not disconnect the power cord from the projector while the file is being written. If the power cord is disconnected, the projector may not start correctly.

Batch Setup Error Notification

The projector's indicators notify you if an error occurs during a batch setup operation. Check the status of the projector's indicators and follow the instructions described in the table here.

| Indicator status | Problem and solutions |
|--|---|
| Laser: Orange - flashing fast Temp: Orange - flashing fast | The batch setup file may be corrupt, or the USB flash drive may not be connected correctly. Disconnect the USB flash drive, unplug and then plug in the projector's power cord, and then try again. |
| Power: Blue - flashing fast Status: Blue - flashing fast Laser: Orange - flashing fast Temp: Orange - flashing fast | Writing the settings may have failed and an error may have occurred in the projector's firmware. Stop using the projector, remove the power plug from the electrical outlet. Contact Epson for help. |

Color Mode

- **☞** Image > Color Mode
- Extended > Multi-Projection > Screen Matching > Color Mode

You can adjust the vividness of image colors for various image types and environments. The brightness of the image varies depending on the mode selected.

Dynamic

This is the brightest mode. Ideal for use in a bright room.

Presentation

The images are vivid and brought to life. Ideal for making presentations or watching a TV program in a bright room.

Natural

Reproduces colors faithfully. Ideal for projecting still pictures such as photos.

Cinema

Gives images a natural tone. Ideal for watching films in a dark room.

BT.709

Produces images that conform to the ITU-R BT.709.

DICOM SIM

This produces images with clear shadows. Ideal for projecting X-ray photographs and other medical images. The projector is not a medical device and cannot be used for medical diagnosis.

Multi-Projection

Minimize the color tone difference between each projected image. Ideal for projecting from multiple projectors.



You can also change the projector's Color Mode using the [Color Mode] button on the remote control.

Brightness

☞ Image > Brightness

You can lighten or darken the overall image.

Contrast

☞ Image > Contrast

You can adjust the difference between light and dark areas of the image.

Color Saturation

☞ Image > Color Saturation

You can adjust the intensity of the image colors.

Tint

☞ Image > Tint

You can adjust the balance of green to magenta tones in the image.

Sharpness

☞ Image > Sharpness

You can adjust the sharpness or softness of image details.

Standard

You can adjust the image sharpness so that it is sufficiently balanced.

Thin Line Enhancement

Higher values enhance the details such as hair or fabric patterns.

Thick Line Enhancement

Higher values enhance the outline, background, and the other main parts of the objects in the image to show them clearly.

White Balance

☞ Image > White Balance

You can adjust the overall tint of the image.

Color Temp.

You can adjust the overall tint of the image within a range from 3200K to 10000K. Higher values tint the image blue and lower values tint the image red.

When **Color Mode** is set to **Dynamic**, the set Color Temp. may differ from the actual Color Temp. of the light from the projector. Use this menu as a guide.

G-M Correction

Higher values tint the image green and lower values tint the image red.

Offset R/Offset G/Offset B/Gain R/Gain G/Gain B

You can adjust the individual R (red), G (green), and B (blue) components of the offset and gain.

4K Enhancement

☞ Image > Image Enhancement > 4K Enhancement

You can project an image at a doubled resolution by diagonally shifting 1 pixel in increments of 0.5 pixels. A high-resolution image signal is projected in fine detail.

Off

If a signal that exceeds the panel resolution of this projector is input, the image is displayed according to the panel resolution of this projector.

Full HD

For a signal with a resolution of 1080i/1080p/WUXGA or higher.

WUXGA+

For a signal with a resolution that exceeds WUXGA. When projecting a high-resolution movie, you can project a high-definition image by using this setting with **Image Preset Mode**.

Image Menu 71



- You cannot select this setting when the **Aspect** setting is set to **Native** in the projector's **Signal** menu.
- When projecting from multiple projectors, select **Off** to unify each image.
- Off is ideal for projecting presentation materials from computers and so on.
- If you select **Full HD** or **WUXGA+**, the status corrected using the following function is canceled.
 - Edge Blending
- Scale
- Curved Surface
- Point Correction
- Corner Wall

When you change the **4K Enhancement** setting to **Off**, the settings return to their previous state.

- To minimize delays, select Off.
- If you select **Off**, you cannot set the other items in the **Image Enhancement** setting.
- After selecting **Preset 1** to **Preset 5**, you can fine tune each setting individually. The settings value in the preset option are overwritten.
- The settings value are overwritten separately when 4K Enhancement is enabled and disabled.

Frame Interpolation

☞ Image > Image Enhancement > Frame Interpolation

You can play fast moving images smoothly by producing intermediate frames between the original frames.

If your resulting images contain noise, set to Off.



You cannot select this setting in the following cases.

- 4K Enhancement is enabled.
- A signal with a resolution that exceeds WUXGA is input.
- Aspect is set to V-Zoom.
- Scale is set to Auto or Manual.
- Edge Blending is set to On.
- Image Preset Mode is set to Off.

Deinterlacing

☞ Image > Image Enhancement > Deinterlacing

You can set whether or not to convert interlaced-to-progressive signals for certain video image types.

Off

For fast-moving video images.

Video

For most video images.

Film/Auto

For movies, computer graphics, and animation.



Setting is only displayed in the following cases.

- The current signal is interlaced signal (480i/576i/1080i).
- Image Preset Mode is enabled.

Noise Reduction

☞ Image > Image Enhancement > Noise Reduction

You can reduce flickering in images when inputting progressive signals or progressive interlace signals.



You cannot select this setting in the following cases.

- 4K Enhancement is enabled.
- A signal with a resolution that exceeds WUXGA is input.
- Image Preset Mode is set to Off.

MPEG Noise Reduction

☞ Image > Image Enhancement > MPEG Noise Reduction

You can reduce the noise or artifacts seen in MPEG video.



You cannot select this setting in the following cases.

- 4K Enhancement is enabled.
- A signal with a resolution that exceeds WUXGA is input.
- Image Preset Mode is set to Off.

Super-resolution

☞ Image > Image Enhancement > Super-resolution

You can reduce blurring when projecting low resolution images.

Fine Line Adjust

Higher values enhance details such as hair or fabric patterns.

Soft Focus Detail

Higher values enhance the outline, background, and the other main parts of the objects in the image to show them clearly.



You cannot select this setting when the **Image Preset Mode** setting is set to **Off**.

Detail Enhancement

☞ Image > Image Enhancement > Detail Enhancement

You can create a more emphatic texture and material feel of the image.

Strength

Higher values enhance the contrast.

Range

Higher values widen the range of detailed enhancement.



- Depending on the image, a highlight may be noticeable at the border between colors. If this bothers you, set a smaller value.
- You cannot select this setting when the **Image Preset Mode** setting is set to **Off**.

Reset (Image Enhancement)

☞ Image > Image Enhancement > Reset

You can reset the settings on the **Image Enhancement** setting to their default preset settings.



You cannot select this setting when the **Image Preset Mode** setting is set to **Off**.

Scene Adaptive Gamma

☞ Image > Advanced > Scene Adaptive Gamma

You can adjust the coloring according to the scene, and obtains a more vivid image.

Higher values enhance the more the contrast.

Gamma

☞ Image > Advanced > Gamma

You can adjust the coloring by selecting one of the gamma correction values, or referring to a gamma graph. If you want to make finer adjustments, select **Customized**.

When you select a smaller value, you can reduce the overall brightness of the image to make the image sharper. When you select a larger value, the dark areas of images become brighter, but the color saturation for lighter areas may become weaker.



- Project a still picture to adjust the Gamma. You cannot adjust the Gamma correctly when projecting movies.
- If you set the Color Mode setting to DICOM SIM in the projector's Image menu, select the adjustment value according to the projection size.
- If the projection size is 120 inches or less, select a small value.
- If the projection size is 120 inches or more, select a large value.
- Medical images may not be reproduced correctly depending on your settings and screen specifications.

RGBCMY

☞ Image > Advanced > RGBCMY

You can adjust the Hue, Saturation, and Brightness of each color R (red), G (green), B (blue), C (cyan), M (magenta), Y (yellow) individually.

Dynamic Contrast

☞ Image > Dynamic Contrast

You can adjust the projected luminance based on the image brightness.

Dynamic Contrast

Set to **On** to automatically adjust the amount of light.

Response Speed

Select **High Speed** to adjust the amount of light as soon as the scene changes.

Black Level

Set the black level when the brightness level of the image signal is zero. When you select $\bf 0\%$, the light source turns off.

Image Menu 74

Lights-Out Control

☞ Image > Lights-Out Control

You can set the light source to turn off automatically.

Lights-Out Control

Set to **On** to automatically turn off the light source when the signal level falls below the reference level for a set period of time.

Lights-Out Signal Level

Set the brightness level for the video signal being controlled. After turning off automatically, it turns on immediately when exceeding the specified image level.

Lights-Out Timer

Set the amount of time before automatically turning off the light source.

Reset (Image menu)

☞ Image > Reset

You can reset all adjustment values on the **Image** menu to their default settings.

Normally, the projector automatically detects and optimizes the input signal settings. If you need to customize the settings, you can use the **Signal** menu. The available settings depend on the currently selected input source. The settings are saved separately for each selected input source.

Resolution

☞ Signal > Resolution

You can set the input signal resolution.

Auto

Select to automatically identify the resolution of the input signal.

If not detected automatically using the **Auto** option, select the following options.

Wide

For wide screens.

Normal

For 4:3 or 5:4 screens depending on the connected computer.

Manual

You can specify the resolution. This is ideal when connected computer is fixed.



Setting is only displayed when the current source is Computer.

Aspect

Signal > Aspect

The projector can display images in different width-to-height ratios called aspect ratios. Normally, the input signal from your video source determines the image's aspect ratio. However, for certain images you can change the aspect ratio to fit your screen.

Auto

Automatically sets the aspect ratio according to the input signal and the **Resolution** setting.

Normal

Displays images using the full projection area and maintains the aspect ratio of the image.

4:3

Converts the aspect ratio of the image to 4:3.

16:9

Converts the aspect ratio of the image to 16:9.

Full

Displays images using the full size of the projection area, but does not maintain the aspect ratio.

H-Zoom/V-Zoom

Displays images using the full width (H-Zoom) or full height (V-Zoom) of the projection area and maintains the aspect ratio of the image. Areas that exceed the edges of the projected screen are not projected.

Native

Displays images as is (aspect ratio and resolution are maintained). Areas that exceed the edges of the projected screen are not projected.



- Setting is only displayed when the current source is Computer or HDML
- Available only when the **Scale** setting is set to **Off** or the **Scale Mode** setting is set to **Full Display**.
 - Signal > Scale > Scale Mode
- Set the **Screen Type** setting in the projector's **Extended** menu before changing the aspect ratio.
- Extended > Display > Screen > Screen Type
- To display images without black bars, set Resolution to Wide or Normal in the projector's Signal menu according to the computer's resolution.
- The available aspect ratio setting varies depending on the selected **Screen Type** setting and the input signal from your image source.
- Note that using the aspect ratio function of the projector to reduce, enlarge, or split the projected image for commercial purposes or for public viewing may infringe upon the rights of the copyright holder of that image based on copyright law.
- If there are margins between the edge of the image and the projected screen frame, you can adjust the position of the image using the **Screen Position** setting in the projector's **Extended** menu.
- Extended > Display > Screen > Screen Position
- You can change the projector's Aspect using the [Aspect] button on the remote control.

Tracking

☞ Signal > Tracking

You can adjust the signal to eliminate vertical stripes in computer images.



Setting is only displayed when the current source is Computer.

Sync.

Signal > Sync.

You can adjust the signal to eliminate fuzziness or flickering in computer images.



Setting is only displayed when the current source is Computer.

Position

Signal > Position

You can adjust the image location on the screen.



Setting is only displayed when the current source is Computer.

Auto Setup

☞ Signal > Auto Setup

Set to **On** to automatically optimize computer image quality.



Setting is only displayed when the current source is Computer.

Overscan

Signal > Overscan

Signal Menu

You can change the projected image ratio to make the edges visible by a selectable percentage or automatically.



Setting is only displayed when the input signal is component signal.

Blanking

☞ Signal > Blanking

You can hide images in the specified area.

Use the arrow buttons on the control panel or remote control to adjust the area. You can hide up to half of the projected image in each direction (except for one pixel).



Setting is only displayed when the **Content Playback** setting is set to **Off** in the projector's **Settings** menu.

Color Space

☞ Signal > Color Space

You can switch the color space that can handle the color information of the input image.

Select **Auto** to apply a suitable color space for the AVI InfoFrame of the image.



Setting is only displayed in the following cases.

- The current source is HDMI, HDBaseT, DVI-D, or SDI (EB-PU2010B/EB-PU2010W).
- Color Mode is set to other than BT.709 or DICOM SIM.

Dynamic Range

☞ Signal > Dynamic Range

You can set the video range to match the setting of input source.

Select **Auto** to automatically identify the dynamic range of the input signal.

The result for your selected setting is displayed as **Signal Status**.

HDR10 Setting

You can adjust the PQ curve of the dynamic range in the HDR PQ (Perceptual Quantizer) method.

HLG Setting

You can adjust the HLG curve of the dynamic range in the HDR HLG (Hybrid Log Gamma) method.



- Setting is only displayed in the following cases.
 - The current source is HDMI, HDBaseT, or SDI (EB-PU2010B/EB-PU2010W).
 - Color Mode is set to other than BT.709 or DICOM SIM.
- HDR10 Setting is only available when Signal Status is set to HDR10.
- HLG Setting is only available when Signal Status is set to HLG.

Video Range

☞ Signal > Advanced > Video Range

You can set the video range to match the setting of input source from the HDMI, DVI-D, or HDBaseT port.

Limited (16-235)

For the brightness range 16 to 235.

Full (0-255)

For the brightness range 0 to 255.

EDID

☞ Signal > Advanced > EDID

Even if you setup multiple displays with different resolutions, you can set the same EDID as the standard display and switch the EDID of the current source to unify the EDID across the displays.

Preset EDID

You can set the **EDID** options as a batch using preset values.

The following settings are saved in the preset options.

- Resolution
- Refresh Rate
- Color Depth

You can change the preset settings if necessary.



- Setting is only displayed when the current source is HDMI, HDBaseT, or DVI-D.
- Select Reset to reset all adjustment values for EDID to their default values.

Scale

- **☞** Signal > Scale
- **Extended** > Multi-Projection > Scale

You can enlarge or reduce the image in the vertical and horizontal directions. When using multiple projectors to project one image, you can adjust the scale of the image displayed by each projector.

Scale

When set to **Auto**, the clip position is set automatically depending on the **Edge Blending** and **Tiling** settings. After selecting **Auto**, you can fine tune manually.

Select Manual to adjust the clip range and position manually.

Scale Mode

Select how to change the magnification.

- Zoom Display to maintain the image position and aspect ratio.
- Full Display to adjust the image according to the image position and aspect ratio.

Scale Horizontally/Scale Vertically

You can adjust the magnification horizontally and vertically in 0.01x increments, and enlarge or reduce the image. (Minimum magnification of 0.5 to maximum magnification of 10.)

Clip Adjustment

Use the arrow buttons to adjust the coordinates and size of each image as you view the screen.

Clip Range

You can view the clipped area you selected.

Reset (Signal menu)

Signal > Reset

You can reset all adjustment values on the **Signal** menu to their default settings, except for the following:

Geometry Correction

- Settings > Geometry Correction
- **Extended** > Multi-Projection > Geometry Correction
- **Extended** > Multi-Projection > Simple Stacking > Point Correction

You can adjust image shape to rectangular. After correction, your image is slightly smaller.

You can check the available adjustment range in the projector's Specifications.

Off

Temporarily cancels geometry correction. Even when set to **Off**, the correction values are saved.

H/V-Keystone

Manually corrects distortion in the horizontal and vertical directions independently. If the image aspect is incorrect, adjust the image balance by using **V-Balance** and **H-Balance**.

You cannot combine with other correction methods.

Ouick Corner

Corrects each of the four corners of the projected image independently.

Curved Surface

Corrects the corners and sides of an image projected on a curved surface with the same radius.



- Place the projector so it squarely faces the screen, not at an angle.
- Move the lens position to the home position.
- If a large amount of adjustment is performed, the focus may not be uniform even after making adjustments.
- If you set the **Maintain Aspect Ratio** setting to **On** after correcting the corrections may not be applied. Reset the corrections to their default values or reduce the amount of correction, and try it again.
- If you change the standard line during correcting, the present settings are reset.

Corner Wall

Corrects the corners and sides of an image projected on a curved surface with right angles.



- Place the projector so it squarely faces the screen, not at an angle.
- Move the lens position to the home position.
- If a large amount of adjustment is performed, the focus may not be uniform even after making adjustments.
- We recommend you adjust the image shape based on the point nearest to the center of the screen.

Point Correction

Divides the projected image into a grid and corrects the distortion in 0.5 pixel increments by moving the selected point of intersection in any

direction. You can move the points on the grid between 0.5 to 600 pixels in any direction, including outside the projection range.

Memory

You can save the shape of an image you have adjusted and load it when needed



- You can also open the Geometry Correction screen using the [Geometry] button on the control panel or remote control.
- You can also open the Memory screen using the [Memory] button on the remote control.

Split Screen

Settings > Split Screen

You can simultaneously project two images from different image sources.

Screen Size

Select the screen size.



Depending on the video signals that are input, the images on the left and right may not appear to be the same size even if you select **Equal**.

Source

Select the input source.



- The following input source combinations cannot be projected on a split screen.
 - Computer and LAN
 - DVI-D and HDMI
- Input signals with a horizontal resolution exceeding 1920 are not supported.

Swap Screens

You can swap images that are being projected on the left and right.

Audio Source

Select the screen from which you want to hear audio.

When you select **Auto**, audio is output from the enlarged screen. If the screen sizes is set to **Equal**, audio is output from the screen on the left.



- While using the split screen feature, other projector features may not be available and some settings may be automatically applied to all images.
- You cannot perform split screen projection when the **Content Playback** setting is set to **On** in the projector's **Settings** menu.
- You can also open the Split Screen Setup screen using the [Split] button on the remote control.

Split Screen Projection Restrictions

Operating restrictions

The following operations cannot be performed during split screen projection.

- Setting the projector's menu
- E-Zoom
- Switching the aspect mode (the aspect mode is set to **Normal**)
- Operations using the [User] button on the remote control

Image restrictions

- If you make adjustments such as **Brightness**, **Contrast**, **Color Saturation**, **Tint**, and **Sharpness** in the projector's **Image** menu, you can apply them only to the image on the left. Default adjustments are applied to the image on the right. Adjustments that affect the entire projected image such as **Color Mode** and **Color Temp.** are applied for both left and right images.
- Even if you make adjustments for **Noise Reduction** and **Deinterlacing** in the projector's **Image** menu, **Noise Reduction** is set to 0 and **Deinterlacing** is set to **Off** for the image on the right.

Settings Menu

• Even if you set **Display Background** to **Logo** in the projector's **Extended** menu, the blue screen appears when no image signal is being input.

Volume

Settings > Volume

You can control the speaker volume.



Caution

Do not start a presentation at a high volume setting. Sudden loud noises may cause hearing loss.

Always lower the volume before powering off, so that you can power on and then gradually increase the volume.

HDMI Link

Settings > HDMI Link

You can adjust the HDMI Link options that allow the projector remote to control HDMI-connected devices.

Device Connections

The devices connected to the HDMI ports are listed.

HDMI Link

Set to **On** to enable the HDMI Link features.

Audio Out Device

You can select whether to output audio from the internal speakers or a connected audio/video system.

Power On Link

You can control what happens when you turn on the projector or connected device.

• Bidirectional: automatically turns on the connected device when you turn on the projector, and vice versa.

- Device -> PJ: automatically turns on the projector when you turn on the connected device
- PJ -> Device: automatically turns on the connected device when you turn on the projector.

Power Off Link

You can control whether connected devices are turned off when you turn off the projector.

Link Buffer

You can improve the performance of the linked operations by changing the settings if the HDMI Link function is not working correctly.



Set the **HDMI Link** setting to **On** first to adjust the options.

You can control projector button locking to secure the projector.

Full Lock

All buttons locked.

Except for Power

All buttons except the [On] button locked.

Off

No buttons locked.



- You can control projector button locking using the control panel lock button on the control panel.
- To unlock the buttons, hold down the [Enter] button on the control panel for approximately 7 seconds. A message is displayed and the lock is released.

Lens Lock

Settings > Lock Setting > Lens Lock

You can disable [Lens Shift], [Zoom], and [Focus] button operations on the remote control.

Light Source Mode

Settings > Brightness Settings > Light Source Mode

You can select the brightness for the light source.

Normal

Maximum brightness. This makes the light source operation time approximately 20,000 hours.

Medium

85% brightness with fan noise louder than **Quiet**. This makes the light source operation time approximately 20,000 hours.

Quiet

70% brightness with reduced fan noise. This makes the light source operation time approximately 20,000 hours.

Extended

70% brightness and extends the life expectancy of the light source. This makes the light source operation time approximately 30,000 hours.

Custom

You can select a custom brightness level.



Setting is only displayed when **Constant Brightness** is set to **Off**.

Brightness Level

Settings > Brightness Settings > Brightness Level

Extended > Multi-Projection > Screen Matching > Brightness Settings > Brightness Level

You can select the **Custom** brightness level you want.



Setting is only displayed when **Light Source Mode** is set to **Custom**.

Constant Brightness

Settings > Brightness Settings > Constant Brightness

You can maintain the brightness of the light source set in the **Brightness Level** setting.



- Setting is only displayed when **Light Source Mode** is set to **Custom**.
- When set to On, you cannot change the settings for Light Source Mode and Brightness Level.
- When set to **Off**, the **Brightness Level** setting changes according to the status of the light source.

Estimated Remains

Settings > Brightness Settings > Estimated Remains

You can check how long the projector can maintain constant brightness.



Setting is only displayed when **Constant Brightness** is set to **On**.





You can display a test pattern to assist in focusing and zooming the image and correcting image shape.



- Press the [Page] button to change the test pattern while displaying a test pattern.
- Press the [Esc] button to cancel pattern display.
- The test pattern's shape is determined by the **Screen Type** setting. Be sure to set the correct screen type before adjusting with the test pattern.
- Extended > Display > Screen > Screen Type
- To set menu items that cannot be set while the test pattern is being displayed or to fine-tune the projected image, project an image from the connected device.

Lens Position

You can save the position of the lens adjusted using lens shift, zoom, focus, and distortion. You can register up to 10 memories with different names.

Geometry Correction

You can save the adjustment value of the geometry correction. You can register up to 3 memories with different names.

You can use the following options for each memory type.

Load Memory

You can load the saved memory. The settings applied to the current image are replaced with the settings in the memory.

Save Memory

You can save your current settings to memory.

Erase Memory

You can erase the selected memory settings.

Rename Memory

You can rename a saved memory.

Reset Memory Settings

You can delete all saved memories.



- A memory name that has already been used is indicated by a blue mark. Saving over a previously saved memory overwrites the settings with your current settings.
- The lens position when a memory is loaded may not completely match the lens position when the memory was saved. If there is a large discrepancy between the lens position, calibrate the lens.

- Make sure your computer or device is connected to the same network as the projector.

The selected files are copied to the connected USB flash drive.

Home Screen Auto Disp.

Set to **On** to display the Home screen automatically when there is no input signal when turning on the projector.

Custom Function 1/Custom Function 2

Select menu options to be assigned to the Home screen.

Menu Position

Extended > Display > Menu Position

You can select the position of the projector menu displayed on the screen.

Message Position

Extended > Display > Message Position

You can select the position of messages displayed on the screen.

Messages

Extended > Display > Messages

You can control whether messages are displayed on the screen.

Display Background

Extended > Display > Display Background

You can select the screen color or logo to display when no signal is received.



Setting is only displayed when Content Playback is set to Off.

Startup Screen

Extended > Display > Startup Screen

You can control whether a special screen appears when the projector starts up.



This function is disabled when you turn on the projector in **Quick Startup** mode.

Standby Confirmation

Extended > Display > Standby Confirmation

You can display a confirmation message after pressing the [Standby] button on the remote control.

When set to **Off**, you can turn off the projector simply by pressing the [Standby] button once.

Air Filter Notice

Extended > Display > Air Filter Notice

You can display a message when a clog in the air filter is detected.

Screen

Extended > Display > Screen

You can set the aspect ratio and position of the projected image according to the type of screen being used.

Screen Type

Set the aspect ratio of the screen to fit the image into the projection area.

Screen Position

You can shift the image position horizontally and vertically if there are margins between the edge of the image and the projected screen frame due to the **Screen Type** setting.



- Adjust the aspect ratio for the projected image, if necessary.
- When the **Screen Type** setting changes, the **EDID** settings are automatically adjusted.
- Settings are only displayed when Content Playback is set to Off.
- This setting is unavailable when projecting images from a computer over a network.

Panel Alignment

Set to **On** to correct color misalignment in the projected image.

Select Color

Select the color you want to adjust.

Pattern Color

Select the grid color displayed during adjustments.

- R/G/B to display the grid color in white.
- R/G to display the grid color in yellow.
- **G/B** to display the grid color in cyan.

The available color varies depending on the **Select Color** setting.

Start Adjustments

Starts the panel alignment process.

The image may become distorted while adjusting. The image is restored once adjustments are complete.

- **Shift the whole panel** to adjust the whole panel roughly.
- Adjust the four corners to adjust the four corners of the panel precisely. If you need to make additional adjustments, select **Select intersection** and adjust to adjust more precisely.

Reset

You can reset all adjustment values on the **Panel Alignment** menu to their default settings.



- Image quality may decline after performing alignment.
- Images for pixels that extend beyond the edge of the projected screen are not displayed.

Color Uniformity

- **Extended** > Display > Color Uniformity
- Extended > Multi-Projection > Screen Matching > Color Uniformity

You can use the color uniformity feature to manually adjust the color tone balance in the projected image.

Color Uniformity

Set to **On** to adjust the color tone balance for the whole screen.

Adjustment Level

Select the adjustment level you want to adjust.

There are eight adjustment levels, from white to gray to black. Adjust each level individually.

Set to **All** to adjust the tint for each color from level 2 to 8 in a batch. (Once the values of red, blue, or green are at maximum or minimum at any level, you cannot perform further adjustments.)

Start Adjustments

Starts adjustments for the selected adjustment level.

The image may become distorted while adjusting. The image is restored once adjustments are complete.

Adjust the outer areas first, and then adjust the entire screen.

Reset

You can reset all adjustment values on the **Color Uniformity** menu to their default settings.



The color tone may not be uniform even after adjusting the color uniformity.

OSD Rotation

Extended > Display > OSD Rotation

You can rotate the menu display 90°.

User's Logo

Extended > User's Logo

You can save an image on the projector and display it whenever the projector turns on. You can also display the image when the projector is not receiving an input signal. This image is called the user's logo screen.

You can select a photo, graphic, or company logo as the user's logo, which is useful in identifying the projector's owner to help deter theft. You can prevent changes to the user's logo by setting up password protection.

Display the image you want to project as the user's logo and then select this setting.



- If the **User's Logo Protection** setting in the **Password Protection** setting menu is set to **On**, set to **Off** before saving the user's logo.
- When you copy the menu settings from one projector to another using the batch setup feature, user's logo is also copied. Do not register the information that you do not want to share between multiple projectors as a user's logo.
- You cannot save content that is protected by HDCP.
- When **Content Playback** is set to **On**, you can display the user's logo only when the projector starts up.
- Adjustments for image shape and display range are temporarily canceled when you select **User's Logo**.

Projection

Extended > Projection

You can set the way the projector faces the screen so the image is oriented correctly.



You can change the projection mode to flip the image over top-to-bottom by holding down the [A/V Mute] button on the remote control for approximately 5 seconds.

Direct Power On

Extended > Operation > Direct Power On

Set to **On** to turn on the projector by plugging it in without pressing the power button.

Note that the projector also turns on automatically in cases such as recovery from a power outage.

Sleep Mode

Extended > Operation > Sleep Mode

Set to ${\bf On}$ to automatically turns off the projector after an interval of inactivity.

Sleep Mode Timer

Extended > Operation > Sleep Mode Timer

You can set the time before the projector automatically turns off from 1 to 30 minutes.



Sleep Mode must be turned on.

High Altitude Mode

Extended > Operation > High Altitude Mode

When operating the projector at an altitude where the air is thin, the normal rotation speed of the fans is not enough to cool the projector.

Set to **On** to increase the rotation speed of the fans at altitudes above 1500 m.



When set to **On**, the projector's operating temperature will rise.

Auto Source Search

Extended > Operation > Auto Source Search

Set to **On** to detect the input signal automatically and project images when there is no input signal.



- Setting is only displayed when **Content Playback** is set to **Off**.
- This function is disabled when you turn on the projector in the **Quick Startup** mode.

Auto Power On

Extended > Operation > Auto Power On

Set to **Computer** to automatically turns on the projector when it detects an input signal from the image source.

Startup Source

Extended > Operation > Startup Source

You can select the image source you want to project when the projector is turned on in Content Playback mode.

Quick Startup

Extended > Operation > Quick Startup

You can set the time period for Quick Startup mode. The projector enters this mode when you turn it off. You can start projecting in approximately 7 seconds by pressing the power button.



Set A/V Output to While Projecting first.

USB Power

Extended > Operation > USB Power

Set to **Always On** to continue supplying power to the streaming media player when the projector is not projecting images. This lets the streaming media player start earlier, or perform its firmware updates automatically over a network if necessary.



Set A/V Output to While Projecting first.

A/V Mute Settings

Extended > Operation > A/V Mute Settings

You can adjust the A/V Mute settings.

Fade-in

Set the number of seconds for a fade-in transition effect when displaying an image.

Fade-out

Set the number of seconds for a fade-out transition effect when hiding an image.

A/V Mute Timer

Release A/V Mute

Select **A/V Mute** if you want to use only the [A/V Mute] button to turn off A/V mute or if you want to send a command to turn off A/V Mute, or select **Any Button** to use any button to turn it off.

Beep

Extended > Operation > Advanced > Beep

You can control the beep that sounds when you turn the projector on or off.

Indicators

Extended > Operation > Advanced > Indicators

Set to **Off** to turn off the indicator lights on the projector except when an error or warning occurs.

Log Save Destination

Extended > Operation > Advanced > Log Save Destination

You can set where you want to save the operation logs for the projector.

Select **USB and Internal Memory** to save logs as text files (.log) to a USB flash drive inserted into the projector's USB-A port.



Setting is only displayed when **Content Playback** is set to **Off**.

Batch Setup Range

Extended > Operation > Advanced > Batch Setup Range

You can select which menu settings you want copied.

All

Select this to copy all of the projector menu settings using the batch setup feature.

Limited

Select this if you do not want to copy the **EDID** and **Network** menu settings.

AC Voltage Monitoring

Extended > Operation > Advanced > AC Voltage Monitoring

Set to **On** to monitor the projector's voltage status and obtain a log when a warning, disconnection, or power blockage occurs.

If you regularly turn off the projector by turning off the power outlet (direct shutdown), set to **Off**.



You can view the log in the projector's **Info** menu.

Select the model number for the attached lens when using the following lenses:

Date & Time

Extended > Operation > Date & Time

You can adjust the projector's system time and date settings.

Daylight Saving Time

Adjust the daylight saving time settings for your region.

Internet Time

Turn on this setting to update the date and time automatically through an Internet time server.



When you set **Schedule Protection** to **On** in the **Password Protection** screen, you cannot change the time and date settings. Set **Schedule Protection** to **Off** first.

Lens Calibration

Extended > Operation > Lens Calibration

You can view information about the lens currently in use.

It takes up to approximately 100 seconds. When calibration is finished, the lens returns to the same position it was in before calibration.

You can select the communication settings for connections to an HDBaseT transmitter or switcher.

Control Communications

You can enable or disable communication from the Ethernet and serial ports on the HDBaseT transmitter or switcher; set to **On** to disable the projector's LAN, RS-232C, and Remote ports.

Extron XTP

Set to **On** when you connect an Extron XTP transmitter or switcher to the **HDBaseT** ports. See the following Extron Web site for more details on the XTP system.

Color Calibration

Set to **On** to enable the color calibration process.

Start Auto Adjustment

Starts auto adjustment.

Undo

You can undo auto adjustment.

Redo

Select after selecting **Undo** to restore the image to the status after auto adjustment.

Color Uniformity

You can adjust the color tone balance for the whole image.

Reset

You can reset all adjustment values on the **Color Calibration** menu to their default settings.

Conditions for Color Calibration

You can use the color calibration feature under the following conditions:

• The optional external camera is installed on each projector.

- You are projecting on a matte white diffusion screen that is flat and even.
- The projector is placed so it squarely faces the screen, not at an angle.
- Nothing is blocking the optional external camera and the projected image.
- Projection size is between 80 to 200 inches.

Projector ID

Extended > Multi-Projection > Projector ID

You can set the projector to a particular ID number which allows you to use a remote control to individually control projectors. This is useful when you want to control multiple projectors using one remote control.



- You need to set the remote control's ID to match the projector's ID to operate only a particular projector.
 - To set the remote control's ID, set the remote control [ID] switch to **On**. Press the [ID] button on the remote control and press the numeric button that matches the projector's ID within 5 seconds. (Enter a one-digit or two-digit number.)
- If you do not know the projector's ID, press the [ID] button during projection to temporarily display the projector's ID and the remote control's ID on the screen.

You can create a group of projectors that you can control simultaneously.

Tiling

You can project the same image from up to 9 projectors to create one large image using the Tiling feature.

Tiling

Set to **Auto** to configure tiling automatically.

If you do not install the optional external camera or tiling the images automatically was unsuccessful, select **Manual**, and then select the **Layout** and **Location Setup** settings individually.

Layout

Select the number of rows and columns you are setting up.

Location Setup

Select the position of each projected image as follows:

- **Row Order** to layout the screens from top to bottom, starting with 1 at the top, in sequential order.
- **Column Order** to layout the screens from left to right, starting with A on the left, in alphabetical order.

Location Info

You can view the name, IP address, and ID of the projector you set.



- Auto is available only when the optional external camera is installed.
- Make sure nothing is blocking the optional external camera while performing automatic tiling.

- **Blend Range** to select the width of the blended area in 1 pixel increments. You can select up to 45% of the projector's resolution.

Set to **On** to display a guide on the blended area.

Pattern Guide

Set to **On** to display a grid to match the blended area.

Guide Color

Select a combination of guide colors.



Set the **Color Mode** setting to **Multi-Projection** in the projector's **Image** menu for all of the projectors.

Black Level

- Extended > Multi-Projection > Black Level
- Extended > Multi-Projection > Screen Matching > Black Level

You can adjust the brightness and tone differences in overlapping images.

Color Adjustment

You can adjust the brightness and tone of the areas. The adjustment areas are displayed based on the **Edge Blending** setting.

When multiple screens are overlapping, adjust overlapping areas starting with the brightest areas first. Adjust the non-overlapping area (darkest part) last.

Area Correction

If the tone for some areas does not match, you can adjust it individually.

Reset

You can reset all adjustment values on the **Black Level** menu to their default settings.

You can reset all adjustment values on the **Multi-Projection** menu to their default settings.

Screen Matching

Extended > Multi-Projection > Screen Matching

You can adjust the tint, brightness, black level, and blend curve of multiple projectors so that they match better.

If your projectors are on a network, the brightness and tint for multiple projectors are corrected automatically based on the darkest projector.

If your projectors are not on a network or automatic adjustment was unsuccessful, you can adjust the tint and brightness of multiple projectors manually.



- The auto adjustment feature is only available under the following conditions.
- When you set the position of each image
- When Color Calibration is set to On
- You can undo or redo the screen matching procedure only when **Light Source Mode** is set to **Custom**.
- The required time for screen matching varies depending on the projector layout. It takes up to approximately 18 minutes.

Conditions for Screen Matching

You can use the screen matching feature under the following conditions:

- All of the projectors are the same model and the optional external camera is installed on each projector.
- You are projecting on a matte white diffusion screen that is flat and even.
- The projector is placed so it squarely faces the screen, not at an angle.
- Nothing is blocking the optional external camera and the projected image.
- More than 20 minutes have passed after turning on the projector.
- The projectors to be adjusted are grouped.
- The projected images do not overlap or have gaps between them, and create a rectangular image after tiling.
- Projection size is between 80 to 200 inches.
- All the projectors are connected to the same network and project images with the same resolution.
- The Blend Range setting is set between 15 to 45%.
- **Projection** in the projector's **Extended** menu is set to **Front** or **Front/Ceiling** for all projectors.

Color Matching

Extended > Multi-Projection > Screen Matching > Color Matching

You can adjust the tint and brightness for the color tone from white to black. During color matching, half of the overlapped area is displayed in black so that you can check the edge of the image easily.

Adjustment Level

Select the adjustment level you want to adjust.

There are eight adjustment levels, from white to gray to black. Adjust each level individually.

Set to **All** to adjust the tint for each color from level 2 to 8 in a batch. (Once the values of red, blue, or green are at maximum or minimum at any level, you cannot perform further adjustments.)

Red/Green/Blue

You can adjust the tone for each color.

Brightness

You can adjust the image brightness.

Simple Stacking

Extended > Multi-Projection > Simple Stacking

You can easily and quickly create a bright projected image by overlapping the images of multiple projectors.

Point Correction

Divides the projected image into a grid and corrects the distortion in 0.5 pixel increments by moving the selected point of intersection in any direction. You can move the points on the grid between 0.5 to 600 pixels in any direction, including outside of the projection range.

Start Auto Adjustment

You can automatically adjust the projected image using the camera assist functions.

The projector for which you perform this feature becomes a master projector, and the adjustment is performed based on the projector's image position and shape.



- Connect two projectors using a LAN cable.
- Make sure you do the following before adjusting:
 - Set the **DHCP** setting to **On** in the projector's **Network** menu for two projectors.
 - Network > Network Configuration > Wired LAN > IP Settings
 - Adjust the image position, shape, and focus on the master projector. If you adjust the image shape of the master projector, select **Point Correction** and select **Quick Corner** to correct the shape.
 - The required time for simple stacking varies depending on the projector layout. It takes up to approximately 4 minutes.

You can use the simple stacking feature under the following conditions:

- All of the projectors are the same model and the optional external camera is installed on each projector.
- Wait for 2 minutes after turning on two projectors before starting the simple stacking process.
- You are projecting on a matte white diffusion screen that is flat and even.
- The projector is placed so it squarely faces the screen, not at an angle.
- Nothing is blocking the optional external camera and the projected image.
- The projection size is within the following range according to the brightness of the light source (when the screen illuminance is 40 lux or less).
- Up to 9.9 Klm: 50 to 200 inches
- 10 Klm: 60 to 300 inches
- All the projectors are projecting images at the same resolution.

- The illuminance ratio on the screen surface when projecting an all-white screen and when projecting an all-black screen is 8:1 or more.
- **Projection** in the projector's **Extended** menu is set to **Front** or **Front/Ceiling** for all projectors.

Schedule Settings

- **Extended** > Schedule Settings
- Extended > Multi-Projection > Screen Matching > Schedule Settings

You can schedule various projector tasks.

Schedule Settings

Select **Add New** to schedule events. To save your events, select **Setup complete** and then select **Yes**.

- Event Settings to select the event details you want to perform. Select No Change for items that you do not want to change when the event occurs.
- **Date** / **Time Settings** to select the date and time at which you want the event to occur. You can schedule events up to 4 weeks later.

Schedule Reset

Connects in WPA3 personal mode. Communication is performed using WPA3 security. Uses AES method for encryption. When establishing a connection from a computer to the projector, enter the value set in the passphrase.

WPA2/WPA3-PSK

Connects in WPA2/WPA3 personal mode. Encryption method is selected automatically according to the access point settings. Set a passphrase which is the same for the access point.

WPA3-EAP

Connects in WPA3 enterprise mode. Encryption method is selected automatically according to the access point settings.

WPA2/WPA3-EAP

Connects in WPA2/WPA3 enterprise mode. Encryption method is selected automatically according to the access point settings.



- WPA2-PSK is available only for Quick connection mode.
- WPA3-PSK, WPA2/WPA3-PSK, WPA3-EAP, and WPA2/WPA3-EAP are available only for Advanced connection mode.
- When the **Mail Notification** is set to **Off**, you cannot set security.
- WPA is an encryption standard that improves the security for wireless networks. The projector supports TKIP and AES encryption methods. WPA also includes user authentication functions. WPA authentication provides two methods: using an authentication server, or authenticating between a computer and an access point without using a server. This projector supports the latter method, without a server.
- When setting security, follow the instructions from the administrator of the network system you want to connect to.

Passphrase

☞ Network > Network Configuration > Wireless LAN > Passphrase

For **WPA2-PSK**, **WPA3-PSK**, and **WPA2/WPA3-PSK** security, enter the pre-shared passphrase used on the network. You can enter various passphrases from 8 to 63 alphanumeric characters long.

When the passphrase is entered and the [Enter] button is pressed, the value is set and displayed as an asterisk (*).

We recommend changing the passphrase periodically for security. If the network settings are initialized, it returns to the initial passphrase.

User name

Enter a user name for the network up to 64 alphanumeric characters long. To include a domain name, add it before the backslash and the user name (domain\username).

When importing a client certificate, the name the certificate was issued to is automatically set.

Password

Enter a password for authentication up to 64 alphanumeric characters long. After you enter the password and select **Finish**, the password is displayed as an asterisk (*).

Client Certificate

Import the client certificate.

Verify Server Certificate

You can verify the server certificate when a CA certificate has been set.

CA certificate

Imports the CA certificate.

RADIUS Server Name

Enter the server name to verify up to 32 alphanumeric characters long.

Initializing Projectors

You need to correct the difference in settings for each projector.

Do the following operations for all projectors:

- Reset the projector settings to their default values.
- Reset > Reset All Config
- Reset the values on the **Color Uniformity** menu to their default settings.
- **Extended** > Display > Color Uniformity > Reset
- Reset the values on the **Panel Alignment** menu to their default settings.
- Extended > Display > Panel Alignment > Reset
- Set the **Adjustment Level** setting to **All** in the **Color Matching** menu, and select **0** for **Red**, **Green**, and **Blue**.
- Extended > Multi-Projection > Screen Matching > Color Matching



We recommend you set the **Sleep Mode** setting to **Off** in the projector's **Extended** menu after all initialization is complete.

Multi-Projection Features

Assigning a Master Projector

Select one projector to be the basis for adjustment.

Display test patterns from all projectors and select the one that has less color unevenness as the master projector.



- You can display the test pattern by pressing the **Test Pattern** button on the control panel or remote control.
- We recommend displaying the following test patterns: Gray Bars V, Gray Bars H, and White
- When using the remote control, we recommend assigning the same ID for the master projector and the remote control to limit the control target.

Calibrating Projectors

Adjust changes that occur over time due to repeated use of projectors.

Perform the following operations for all projectors:

- Perform light source calibration.
- Reset > Light Source Calibration
- Perform color calibration.
- **Extended** > Color Calibration

To extend the adjustment range, set the **Color Mode** setting to **Multi-Projection** in the projector's **Image** menu.



- If you do not install the optional external camera or you were unsuccessful performing color calibration, perform Color Uniformity.
- If you set Run Periodically to On in the Light Source Calibration menu, the color adjusted in multi-projection may be changed due to auto calibration.
- You can also change the projector's **Color Mode** using the [Color Mode] button on the remote control.

Installing Projectors

Install all projectors in an appropriate location.

When you install the master projector in the center, you can easily calibrate colors because any unevenness at the center of the projected area is reduced.

Performing Rough Image Adjustments

Perform the following operations for all projectors to adjust the position and the shape for rectangular projected images.

Displaying the test pattern makes it easier to adjust the projection position and the shape.

- For projection position, adjust the location, the angle, and the lens shift.
- For projection size, adjust the location and the zoom.
- For image focus, adjust the focus.



- The projected images are not stable right after turning on the projector. We recommend adjusting the projector at least 20 minutes after you start projecting.
- We recommend displaying the following test patterns: Gray Bars V, Gray Bars H, and White
- When adjusting the image height with vertical lens shift, adjust it by
 moving the image from the bottom to the top.
 If you finish adjusting with the projected image at the bottom, the
 projected image may be in a low position.
- It is not recommended that you perform geometry correction for the following reasons:
 - Image quality may decline.
- If the correction value is too large, image calibration may be difficult.







Epson Projector Management

Epson Projector Management software (Windows only) lets you monitor and control your projector through the network. See the *Epson Projector Management Operation Guide* for instructions.

Epson Web Control

SNMP

Network administrators can install SNMP (Simple Network Management Protocol) software on network computers so they can monitor projectors. If your network uses this software, you can set up the projector for SNMP monitoring.

ESC/VP21 Commands

You can control the projector from an external device using ESC/VP21.

Projector Monitoring and Control Options

When the power ON command is transmitted to the projector, the power turns on and it enters warm-up mode. When the projector's power has turned on, a colon ":" (3Ah) is returned.

When a command is input, the projector executes the command and returns a ":", and then accepts the next command.

If the command being processed terminates abnormally, an error message is output and a ":" is returned.

You can check the available commands and cable layouts in the projector's *Specifications*.

ESC/VP.net Commands

You can monitor the projector using ESC/VP.net commands.

When the **Command Communication** setting is set to **Protected**, you can connect the projector with version 2.0 using **Web Control Password**.

PJLink

PJLink was established by the JBMIA (Japan Business Machine and Information System Industries Association) as a standard protocol for controlling network-compatible projector's as part of their efforts to standardize projector control protocols.

The projector complies with the PJLink Class2 standard established by the JBMIA.

The port number used for the PJLink search function is 4352 (UDP).

You need to make network settings before you can use PJLink.

You may need to clean the projector's lens periodically, and clean the air filter and air vents to prevent the projector from overheating due to blocked ventilation.

The only parts you should replace are the air filter, remote control batteries, and lens. If any other part needs replacing, contact Epson or an authorized Epson servicer.



Marning

Before cleaning any part of the projector, turn it off and unplug the power cord. Never open any cover on the projector, except as specifically explained in this manual. Dangerous electrical voltages in the projector can injure you severely.

Clean the projector's lens periodically, or whenever you notice dust or smudges on the surface.

- To remove dust or smudges, gently wipe the lens with lens-cleaning paper. If the lens is very dirty, use a vacuum cleaner or a air blower to remove any dust or smudges, and wipe the lens.
- To remove stubborn smudges, moisten a soft, lint-free cloth with lens cleaner and gently wipe the lens. Do not spray any liquid directly on the lens.



Marning

Do not use a lens cleaner that contains flammable gas. The high heat generated by the projector may cause a fire.

Attention

- Do not wipe the lens immediately after turning off the light source; otherwise, it could be damaged.
- Do not use glass cleaner or any harsh materials to clean the lens and do not subject the lens to any impacts; otherwise, it could be damaged. Do not use canned air, or the gases may leave a flammable residue.

Cleaning the Projector Case

Before cleaning the projector case, turn off the projector and unplug the power cord.

- To remove dust or dirt, use a soft, dry, lint-free cloth.
- To remove stubborn dirt, use a soft cloth moistened with water and mild soap. Do not spray liquid directly on the projector.

Attention

Do not use wax, alcohol, benzene, paint thinner, or other chemicals to clean the projector case. These can damage the case. Do not use canned air, or the gases may leave a flammable residue.

Regular filter maintenance is important to maintain your projector. Clean the air filter when a message appears telling you the temperature inside the projector has reached a high level. It is recommended that you clean these parts over a 20,000-hour period. Clean them more often than this if you use the projector in an environment that is dustier than expected. (Assuming the projector is used in an atmosphere in which airborne particulate matter is 0.04 mg/m3 or less.)

Attention

If regular maintenance is not performed, your Epson projector will notify you when the temperature inside the projector has reached a high level. Do not wait until this warning appears to maintain your projector filter as prolonged exposure to high temperatures may reduce the life of your projector.

Solutions When No Image Appears

If no image appears, try the following solutions:

- Press the [A/V Mute] button on the remote control to see if the image was temporarily turned off.
- Make sure all necessary cables are securely connected and the power is on for the projector and connected video sources.
- Press the projector's power button to wake it from standby or sleep mode. Also, check if the connected computer is in sleep mode or displaying a blank screen saver.
- If the projector does not respond when you press the control panel buttons, the buttons may be locked for security. Unlock the buttons in the **Control Panel Lock** setting or use the remote control to turn on the projector.
- Settings > Lock Setting > Control Panel Lock
- If the projector does not respond when you press any buttons on the projector, an internal error may have occurred in the projector. Contact Epson for help.
- Adjust the **Brightness** setting in the projector's **Image** menu.

- Adjust the brightness of your projector's light source.
- Settings > Brightness Settings
- Make sure **Messages** is set to **On** in the projector's **Extended** menu.
- Extended > Display > Messages
- The projector may not be able to project copyrighted videos that you play back on a computer. For more details, see the manual supplied with the computer.
- For images projected with Windows Media Center, reduce the screen size from full screen mode.
- For images projected from applications using Windows DirectX, turn off DirectX functions.

Solutions When "No Signal" Message Appears

If the "No Signal" message appears, try the following solutions:

- Press the [Search] (remote control) or [Source Search] (control panel) button on the control panel or remote control until you see the image from the source you want.
- Turn on the connected computer or video source, and press play to begin your presentation, if necessary.
- Check that all cables required for projection are securely connected.
- If you are projecting from a laptop computer, make sure it is set up to display on an external monitor.
- If necessary, turn off the projector and the connected computer or video source, and then turn them back on.
- If you are projecting from an HDMI source, replace the HDMI cable with the shorter one.

Displaying From a Windows Laptop

If the message "No Signal" is displayed when projecting from a laptop, you need to set up the Windows laptop to display on an external monitor.

- Hold down the Windows key and press **P** on your keyboard at the same time, then click **Duplicate**.
- If the same image is not displayed by the laptop and projector, check the Windows **Display** utility to make sure the external monitor port is enabled and extended desktop mode is disabled.
- If necessary, check your video card settings and set the multiple display option to Mirror or Duplicate.

Displaying From a Mac Laptop

If the message "No Signal" is displayed when projecting from a Mac laptop, you need to set up the laptop for mirrored display. (See your laptop manual for details.)

- Open the **System Preferences** utility and select **Displays**.
- 2 Select the **Display** or **Color LCD** option, if necessary.
- Click the **Arrange** or **Arrangement** tab.
- Select Mirror Displays.

Solutions When "Not Supported" Message Appears

If the message "Not supported" is displayed, try the following solutions:

• Make sure the computer's display resolution does not exceed the projector's resolution and frequency limits. If necessary, select a different display resolution for your computer.

Solutions When Only a Partial Image Appears

If only a partial computer image appears, try the following solutions:

- If you are projecting from a computer using a VGA computer cable, press the [Auto] button on the remote control to optimize the image signal.
- Make sure you selected the correct **Screen Type** setting for the screen you are using.

Extended > Display > Screen > Screen Type

If there are margins between the edge of the image and the projected screen frame, adjust the position of the image.

- Extended > Display > Screen > Screen Position
- Make sure the **Scale** setting is turned off in the projector's **Signal** menu.
- Try adjusting the image position using the **Position** setting in the projector's **Signal** menu.
- Press the [Aspect] button on the remote control to select a different image aspect ratio.
- Change the **Resolution** setting in the projector's **Signal** menu according to the signal for the connected equipment.
- Change the **Blanking** setting in the projector's **Signal** menu so that the image appears as you expect.
- If you zoomed into or out of the image using the [E-Zoom] buttons, press the [Esc] button until the projector returns to a full display.
- Check your computer display settings to disable dual display and set the resolution within the projector's limits.
- Check the resolution assigned to your presentation files to see if they are created for a different resolution.
- When projecting in Content Playback mode, make sure you are using the appropriate **Overlay Effect** settings.
- Settings > Content Playback > Overlay Effect
- Make sure you selected the correct **Projection** setting in the projector's **Extended** menu.

Solutions When the Image is not Rectangular

If the projected image is not evenly rectangular, try the following solutions:

- Place the projector directly in front of the center of the screen, facing it squarely, if possible.
- Press the [Geometry] button on the control panel or remote control to adjust the image shape.
- Adjust the **H/V-Keystone** setting to correct the image shape.
- Settings > Geometry Correction > H/V-Keystone
- Adjust the **Quick Corner** setting to correct the image shape.
- Settings > Geometry Correction > Quick Corner
- Adjust the **Curved Surface** setting to correct the corners and sides of an image projected on a curved surface with the same radius.
- Settings > Geometry Correction > Corner Wall
- Adjust the **Corner Wall** setting to correct the corners and sides of an image projected on a curved surface with right angles.
- Settings > Geometry Correction > Curved Surface
- Adjust the **Point Correction** setting to correct slight distortion which occurs partially.
- lacktriangle Settings > Geometry Correction > Point Correction

Solutions When the Image Contains Noise or Static

If the projected image contains electronic interference (noise) or static, try the following solutions:

- Check the cables connecting your computer or video source to the projector. They should be:
- Separated from the power cord to prevent interference
- Securely connected at both ends
- Not connected to an extension cable
- Check the settings in the projector's **Signal** menu to make sure they match the video source.

- Adjust the **Image Enhancement** settings in the projector's **Image** menu.
- **☞** Image > Image Enhancement > Noise Reduction
- **☞** Image > Image Enhancement > MPEG Noise Reduction
- **☞** Image > Image Enhancement > Deinterlacing
- Set the **Resolution** setting to **Auto** in the projector's **Signal** menu.
- Select a computer video resolution and refresh rate that are compatible with the projector.
- If you are projecting from a computer using a VGA computer cable, press the [Auto] button on the remote control to automatically adjust the **Tracking** and **Sync.** settings. If the images are not adjusted correctly, manually adjust the **Tracking** and **Sync.** settings in the projector's **Signal** menu.
- If you adjusted the image shape using the projector controls, try decreasing the **Sharpness** setting in the projector's **Image** menu to improve image quality.
- If you connected an extension power cable, try projecting without it to see if it caused interference in the signal.
- Make sure you selected the correct **Video Range** or **EDID** setting in the projector's **Signal** menu, if available for your image source.
- Signal > Advanced > Video Range
- **☞** Signal > Advanced > EDID

Solutions When the Image is Fuzzy or Blurry

If the projected image is fuzzy or blurry, try the following solutions:

- Adjust the image focus.
- Position the projector close enough to the screen.
- Position the projector so the keystone adjustment angle is not so wide that it distorts the image.
- Clean the projector lens.



To avoid condensation on the lens after bringing the projector in from a cold environment, let the projector warm up to room temperature before using it.

- Adjust the **Sharpness** setting in the projector's **Image** menu to improve image quality.
- If you are projecting from a computer using a VGA computer cable, press the [Auto] button on the remote control to automatically adjust the **Tracking** and **Sync.** settings. If any bands or overall blurriness remain, display a uniformly patterned image on the screen and manually adjust the **Tracking** and **Sync.** settings in the projector's **Signal** menu.
- If you are projecting from a computer, use a lower resolution or select a resolution that matches the projector's native resolution.

Solutions When the Image Brightness or Colors are Incorrect

If the projected image is too dark or light, or the colors are incorrect, try the following solutions:

- Press the [Color Mode] button on the remote control to try different color modes for the image and environment.
- Check your video source settings.
- Adjust the available settings in the projector's **Image** menu for the current input source, such as **Brightness**, **Contrast**, **Tint**, and **Color Saturation**.
- Make sure you selected the correct **Video Range** or **EDID** setting in the projector's **Signal** menu, if available for your image source.
- Signal > Advanced > Video Range
- **☞** Signal > Advanced > EDID
- Make sure you selected the correct RGBCMY setting in the projector's Image menu.
- **☞** Image > Advanced > RGBCMY
- Make sure all the cables are securely connected to the projector and your video device. If you connected long cables, try connecting shorter cables.

- Make sure **Brightness Settings** are set correctly.
- Settings > Brightness Settings
- Position the projector close enough to the screen.
- When using multiple projectors, make sure **Light Source Calibration** in the **Reset** menu is set correctly in all of the projectors. If light source calibration is performed only in some of the projectors, the white balance and the brightness level of the projected image may differ between the projectors.

Solutions When Automatic Adjustments are not Applied Correctly

If you have problems with automatic adjustments not being applied correctly, try the following solutions:

- Be sure to wait at least 20 minutes after turning on the projector before performing automatic adjustments. This gives the projector's temperature a chance to stabilize.
- Check that the camera area is clean.
- Make sure the cable of the optional external camera is securely connected to the projector.
- The optional external camera may be defective. Contact Epson for help.
- Depending on the lens you installed, automatic adjustments may not be available. Automatic adjustment is not available for the following lenses: ELPLR04, ELPLL07, ELPLL08.
- If you are projecting from an analog input source, the changing color and brightness of the image may cause automatic adjustments to not be applied correctly.
- Make sure that a powerful spotlight or source of strong natural light is not shining into the projection environment and interfering with automatic adjustments.
- Check that your image correction and image blending settings are within reasonable ranges. If the projection angle is very large, try turning off the **Geometry Correction** setting or reduce the projection angle. If you are

using the **Edge Blending** setting, make sure the blending width is between 15 to 43%

• If you see an error message during automatic adjustments, check the error codes in the message.

During Screen Matching:

- 0101: Measurement value error
- 0102: Measurement failure
- 0103: Switch camera failure
- 0104/0105: Model mismatch
- 0108: Camera error

During Color Matching:

- 0201: Measurement value error
- 0202: Measurement failure
- 0203: Switch camera failure
- 0208: Camera error

Solutions When Simple Stacking is not Applied Correctly

If you have problems with simple stacking not being applied correctly, try the following solutions:

- Make sure the projectors are placed correctly and connected using a LAN cable.
- Make sure the optional external camera is installed correctly and the cable is securely connected to the projector.
- The optional external camera may be defective. Contact Epson for help.
- Depending on the lens you installed, simple stacking may not be available. Simple stacking is not available for the following lenses: ELPLL07, ELPLL08.

- Make sure that a powerful spotlight or source of strong natural light is not shining into the projection environment and interfering with simple staking.
- Resize the projection size.
- If you see an error message during the simple stacking process, check the error codes in the message.
- 0302: Measurement failure
- 0306: Geometry correction error
- 0308: Communication error

Solutions When an Afterimage Remains on the Projected Image

If you see an afterimage in the projected image, use the **Refresh Mode** feature to clear it. Select **Refresh Mode** > **Start** in the projector's **Reset** menu.

Solutions to Sound Problems

If there is no sound or the volume is too low or high, try the following solutions:

- Adjust the projector's volume settings.
- Press the [A/V Mute] button on the remote control to resume video and audio if they were temporarily stopped.
- Check your computer or video source to make sure the volume is turned up and the audio output is set for the correct source.
- Check the audio cable connections between the projector and your video source.
- Make sure any connected audio cables are labeled "No Resistance".

- If you want to use a connected audio source when the projector is off, set the **Standby Mode** option to **Communication On** and make sure the **A/V Settings** options are set correctly in the projector's **Extended** menu.
- If you want to output audio from a connected audio source when the projector does not project any images, select these settings in the projector's menus:
- Turn off **Quick Startup** in the **Extended** menu.
 - Extended > Operation > Quick Startup
- Set the A/V Output setting to Always On in the Extended menu.
 - Extended > A/V Settings > A/V Output
- If you do not hear sound from an HDMI source, set the connected device to PCM output.
- When you are connecting the projector to a Mac using an HDMI cable, make sure your Mac supports audio through the HDMI port. If not, you need to connect an audio cable.
- If the volume for the computer is set to the minimum while the projector is set to the maximum, the noise may be mixed. Turn up the computer's volume and turn down the projector's volume. (When you use Epson iProjection (Windows/Mac).)

Solutions to Projector Power or Shut-Off Problems

If the projector does not turn on when you press the power button or it turns off unexpectedly, try the following solutions:

- Make sure the power cord is securely connected to the projector and to a working electrical outlet.
- If the power button on the remote control does not turn on the projector, check its batteries and make sure at least one of the remote receivers are available in the **Remote Receiver** setting in the projector's **Settings** menu.
- The projector's buttons may be locked for security. Unlock the buttons in the **Control Panel Lock** setting or use the remote control to turn on the projector.
- If the projector's light source turns off unexpectedly, it may have entered sleep mode after a period of inactivity. Perform any operation to wake the projector. To turn off sleep mode, set the **Sleep Mode** setting to **Off**.
- **Extended** > Operation > Sleep Mode
- If the projector's light source turns off unexpectedly, the A/V mute timer may be enabled. To turn off the A/V mute timer, set the A/V Mute Timer setting to Off.
- Extended > Operation > A/V Mute Settings > A/V Mute Timer
- If the projector's light source turns off, the status indicator is flashing, and the temp (temperature) indicator is lit, the projector has overheated and turned off.

- The cooling fans may run in standby status depending on the projector settings. Also, when the projector wakes from standby status, the fans may cause an unexpected noise. This is not a malfunction.
- The power cord may be defective. Disconnect the cord and contact Epson for help.

Solutions to Problems with the Remote Control

If the projector does not respond to remote control commands, try the following solutions:

- Check that the remote control batteries are installed correctly and have power. If necessary, replace the batteries.
- Make sure you are operating the remote control within the reception angle and range of the projector.
- Make sure the projector is not warming up or shutting down.
- Check to see if a button on the remote control is stuck down, causing it to enter sleep mode. Release the button to wake the remote control up.
- Strong fluorescent lighting, direct sunlight, or infrared device signals may be interfering with the projector's remote receivers. Dim the lights or move the projector away from the sun or interfering equipment.
- Make sure at least one of the remote receivers are available in the **Remote Receiver** setting in the projector's **Settings** menu.
- If you enabled the remote control button lock, press and hold the [Home] button for about 5 seconds to turn it off.
- If you assigned an ID number to the projector to operate multiple projectors from the remote control, you may need to check or change the ID setting.
- Sed the remote control [ID] switch to **Off**. You can operate all of the projectors regardless of the projector ID settings.
- Make sure the optional remote control cable set is not attached to the projector's Remote port. If you leave the cable connected to the port, the remote control cannot control the projector.

- Make sure the Control Communications or Extron XTP setting in the
 Extended menu is set to Off if you are using the optional remote control
 cable set.
 - **☞** Extended > HDBaseT > Control Communications
 - Extended > HDBaseT > Extron XTP
- If you lose the remote control, you can order another one from Epson.

Solutions to Password Problems

If you cannot enter or remember a password, try the following solutions:

- You may have turned on password protection without first setting a password. Try entering **0000** using the remote control.
- If you have entered an incorrect password too many times and see a message displaying a request code, write down the code and contact Epson for help. Provide the request code and proof of ownership for assistance in unlocking the projector.
- If you set an Epson Web Control password and forgot the user ID or password, try entering the following:
- User ID: **EPSONWEB**
- Default password: the projector's serial number
- If you set a Remote password (in Epson Web Control) and forgot the user ID or password, try entering the following:
- User ID: **EPSONREMOTE**
- Default password: the projector's serial number
- If you lose the remote control you cannot enter a password. Order a new one from Epson.

Solution When "The Battery that Saves Your Clock Settings is Running Low" Message Appears

If the message "The battery that saves your clock settings is running low." is displayed, contact Epson for help.

If you cannot play back a playlist correctly, try the following solutions:

- Make sure **Content Playback** is set to **On**.
- Settings > Content Playback > Content Playback
- Make sure the USB flash drive contains a playlist.
- Make sure the USB flash drive is directly connected to the projector. Do not use a multi-card reader or a USB hub to expand a USB port.
- If the USB flash drive is partitioned, you may not be able to play back playlists. Delete all of the partitions before saving the playlists on the USB flash drive.
- Do not share a playlist between projectors that are different in resolution. Color and shape effects added by using **Overlay Effect** may not be reproduced correctly.
- Settings > Content Playback > Overlay Effect

Solutions When Wireless Authentication Fails

If you are having trouble with the authentication, try the following solutions:

- If the wireless settings are correct, but authentication fails, you may need to update the **Date & Time** settings.
- **Extended** > Operation > Date & Time
- Check the **Security** settings in the projector's **Network** menu.
- Network > Network Configuration > Wireless LAN
- If the access point security is WPA3-EAP, change the access point setting to WPA2/WPA3-EAP.

Solutions When You Cannot Access the Projector Through the Web

If you are unable to access the projector through a Web browser, make sure you are using the correct ID and password.

- For the user ID, enter **EPSONWEB**. (You cannot change the user ID.)
- For the password, enter the password set in the projector's **Network** menu. The default password is the projector's serial number.
- Make sure you have access to the network the projector is on.

- If your Web browser is set up to connect via a proxy server, the **Epson Web Control** screen cannot be displayed. Make settings for a connection without using a proxy server.
- If you set the **Standby Mode** setting to **Communication On** in the projector's menu in standby mode, make sure the network device is turned on. After turning on the network device, turn on the projector.
 - Extended > Standby Mode

And connect to a wired LAN, or to a wireless LAN with the **Connection Mode** setting set to **Advanced**.

Solutions When Network Alert E-Mails are not Received

If you do not receive an e-mail alerting you to problems with a projector over the network, try the following solutions:

- Make sure the projector is turned on and connected to the network correctly. (If an error shuts down the projector, the email may not be delivered.)
- Make sure you set up the projector e-mail alert settings correctly in the projector's network **Notifications** menu or in the network software.
- Set the **Standby Mode** setting to **Communication On** so that the network software can monitor the projector in standby mode.
- Extended > Standby Mode

And connect to a wired LAN, or to a wireless LAN with the **Connection Mode** setting set to **Advanced**.

Solutions When the Image Contains Static During Network Projection

If the projected image contains static during network projection, try the following solutions:

- Check for any obstacles between the access point, the computer, the mobile device, and the projector, and change their positions to improve communication.
- Make sure that the access point, the computer, the mobile device and the projector are not too far apart. Move them closer together and try to connect again.
- Check for interference from other equipment, such as a Bluetooth device or microwave. Move the interfering device farther away or expand your wireless bandwidth.
- Reduce the number of connected devices if the connection speed declines.

Solutions When You Cannot Monitor and Control the Projector over a Network

If you are unable to monitor and control the projector with command communication using ESC/VP.net, set the **Command Communication** setting to **Compatible**.
